

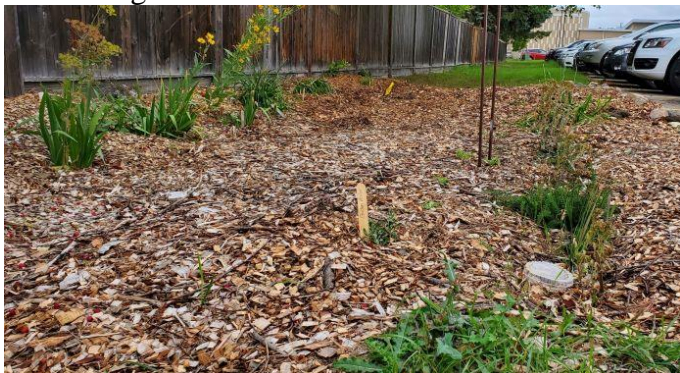

Pollinator Garden at Jenny's house

Last fall, we cleared some old shrubs that were in very poor condition to create a 25-foot garden bed that we could plant as a pollinator garden. Some of the plants are still very small, but here's what it looks like now.

In August we started harvesting. Who knew that kids would eat lettuce! When they pick it straight from



the garden they planted, they love it! Our carrots were rainbow carrots, so there was great anticipation as each carrot was picked to see if it would be orange, purple, red, or white.

In September, we cleaned up the garden after harvesting squash, cantelope, beets, carrots, potatoes, eggplant, and hundreds of tiny yellow tomatoes.

Friends of Wascana Marsh Tour – October 8, 1 pm

The Friends of Wascana Marsh invites you to explore the habitat conservation area (HCA) of the Wascana Marsh. The HCA is a 23-acre fenced off portion of the naturalized area of Wascana Centre for the protection and conservation of birds, turtles, and other wildlife. The site is accessible only by foot and pets and bicycles are not allowed.



Meet at the gate to the HCA 5 minutes before the tour. We will talk about the flora and fauna in the area and

likely see several species of migrating birds heading south to warmer environs

Stray Cat?

If you see a stray cat in your neighbourhood, follow these steps...

Is the cat injured or noticeably thin, unhealthy or in severe conditions? Yes – Call the Humane Society. If no, assume that the cat has an owner.

Statistically, cats have double the chance of find their way home if left in their own neighbourhood. Check to see if the cat has a collar, tattoo, or microchip so you can try to find the owner. File a Found Pet Report on the Humane Society website. www.reginahumanesociety.ca



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
