Invasive Species Week

Invasive species week across Canada was February 20 – 26 this year. Invasive species are plants, animals and other organisms that are not native to an area but have been introduced to it, either intentionally or unintentionally, and harm the ecosystem. Not all non-native species are invasive, but non-native species can become invasive if there are no native predators to control them. Invasive species are one of the most significant threats to global biodiversity after habitat loss. You may have noticed the small sign on the west side




of our parking lot announcing that we are helping to grow a Butterflyway garden. This is part of the David Suzuki Butterflyway project, that is growing

Recycling Corner - Plastics

Plastic is everywhere and it's hard to know what you can reuse, what you can recylce, and what you can do to reduce your plastic consumption. Look on the bottom of a plastic laundry detergent bottle or yogurt container. See the recycling triangle symbol with a number in the middle? Many people assume that indicates how to recycle the plastic. It's actually the plastic resin content.

There are seven standard classifications for plastics.
