#### Children's Garden

Our children's garden started up again May 14th.

Each Tuesday morning we are joined by as many as 30 preschoolers.

We planted seeds the first



week – carrots (lots of them!), peas, beans, beets, lettuce, and radishes. The second week we planted seedlings – tomatoes, cucumbers, pumpkin, zucchini, celery, and broccoli. The older kids helped on May  $10^{\rm th}$  by getting the garden ready and planting potatoes. The children have lots of fun keeping the garden watered!



#### **Bees**

Bees have a built-in superpower: they can see ultraviolet light! They also have five eyes! Each bee

also has 170 odorant receptors, which means they have one serious sense of smell! They use this sense of smell in addition to their sight to navigate



and find nectar-rich flowers more easily.

#### **Goats for Weed Management**

For the third year in a row, goat shepherd Florentine Maathius of No Kidding Weed Management brings her four-legged friends to Regina from Elbow, Saskatchewan. The goats are there to reduce the invasive species in Wascana Park. Invasive vegetation like clover, alfalfa and thistle, that grow in the prairie are the targets for these weed-eating goats. It's a natural solution for weed control. The goats are in Wascana Park for 10 days until the end of May and then will be back sometime in July.
